

# BUCS CRICKET REGULATIONS - SIGNIFICANT CHANGES FOR 2024-25 (VERSION 1)

## PUBLISHED | 16 APRIL 2025

### SUMMARY

This document does not detail all changes to numbering of regulations, or minor editorial changes, but highlights the more significant changes to BUCS' Cricket Regulations for the 2024-25 season that institutions/Playing Entities and umpires should be aware of.

Updated versions of this document will be published should there be further updates to regulations following its initial publication. Additions/changes for Version 2 are highlighted in turquoise.
